Warthog: A Counting Adventure

by Birdie Black, illustrated by Rosalind Beardshaw With the highest rating among preschool testers of any book on our list, this tale focuses on a cute warthog who wanders far away from home. The counting begins on his journey as he encounters one scoop of honey, two angry bees, and so forth until reaching ten footprints. Some numbers are behind sturdy flaps that testers loved to open. ALPHABET BOOK

Alphamals A-Z

by Big Picture Press, illustrated by Graham Carter You'll want to hold onto this book long after your child masters his ABCs. Each letter corresponds with an animal—an armadillo, a zebra, and even a quoll (native to Australia). The uppercase letter, animal name, and a nonfiction poem face a full-page art-decostyle illustration. There's a lot of text, so focus on a few letters a day. Ages 3 to 8, \$18

BEDTIME STORY

All My Friends Are Fast Asleep

by David Weinstone,

illustrated by Magali Le Huche

It has everything you'd want for a nighttime read: dark (but not scary) illustrations; short, lyrical text; and a beloved character to help ease your child to dreamland. "My boys, ages 2 and 4, liked how the boy tried to imitate the way his animal friends slept to make himself tired, and eventually it worked," says one mom reviewer. Ages 2 to 6, \$18

PICTURE BOOK

Fairy Tale Pets

by Tracey Corderoy, illustrated by Jorge Martin Kids got caught up in the twisted storyline: A boy and his dog start a pet-sitting service, but they're surprised when baby bear, three billy goats gruff, and the wolf that blew down the pigs' house show up at the door. Several smaller illustrations per page match up with dialogue to help beginning readers follow along. "My favorite part was when the baby bear yelled, 'Waaa!' after he broke the bed," said a 5-year-old reviewer. A clever ending involving another famous fairy-tale character may, um, sprout a sequel. Ages 4 to 8, \$17

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

Read it to older kids who will get more of the jokes. Ages 6+, \$18
